Dear Students:

The Office for Student Financial Affairs' major purpose is to help eligible students meet educational costs while attending the University of Florida.

Understanding the financial aid process is critical. You probably have many questions about what you can expect and what is expected of you, and you will find many of your answers here. 1. General Information

Paying for college is seldom easy. College costs seem to rise every year, and many families need some form of financial assistance to help pay these costs. This handbook provides information about types and sources of aid, the financial aid application process, and financial aid programs available to help University of Florida students pay their college expenses.



The Office for Student Financial Affairs (SFA)—the financial aid office at the University of Florida (UF)—offers students financial aid counseling and assistance to help them pursue their educational goals.

SFA awards aid to students as a *part of the means* by which they can attend college. Our basic philosophy is that students and parents have the primary responsibility for meeting the student's expenses. Our role is to try to fill the financial gap that may exist between the cost of your education and money available from your family, job income, savings, and other sources.

If you apply for assistance, SFA will evaluate your need and, if you are eligible for assistance, offer you a financial aid "package." Your aid package may consist of scholarships, grants, loans, and/or part-time employment (solely or in combination). The amount of your financial need is determined based on your overall financial status. See "How Your Need is Determined" in this chapter.

Because of limited funds, SFA cannot always offer enough assistance to meet each student's financial need. This handbook, therefore, includes alternative sources of financial aid.

Financial Aid Advisers. SFA provides financial aid advising to students throughout the year. If you have

questions about financial aid after reading this handbook, you can also access our Web site, <http://www.sfa.ufl.edu>.

We invite you to call, visit, or make an appointment. SFA is located at S-107 Criser Hall. Our advising lobby is open Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m.–4:00 p.m. Financial aid advisers are not available until 9:00 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Friday and 9:30 a.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays, but general information is provided.

Satellite Offices and Special Programs
SFA also has satellite offices at the College of Law; the College of Dentistry; the College of Medicine; and the Colleges of Public Health and Health Professions, Nursing, Pharmacy, & Veterinary Medicine. An MBA Adviser and an Adviser to Athletes are housed in our main offices in Criser and Peabody Halls.

TYPES OF AID

Scholarships

Scholarships are awards based on academic achievement, but financial need may also be considered. Scholarships do not have to be repaid and are not contingent on the performance of services. They are considered *gift aid*. Scholarships are awarded by various sources such as the university, the state, individual colleges and departments, and private entities.

Grants

Grants are *gift aid* awarded to students who show financial need. Like scholarships, grants do not have to be repaid.

Loans

Long-term educational loans are *low-interest* (5–9%) loans, some of which allow you to defer repayment until you graduate, withdraw, or drop to less-than-half-time status. Short-term loans for emergency educational expenses are offered through SFA and some individual colleges. Generally, they must be repaid within the semester they were borrowed.

Part-Time Student Employment

Part-time Federal Work-Study employment may be awarded by SFA to students with demonstrated financial need as part of their financial aid award packages. Other student employment programs, such as Other Personnel Services (OPS), do not require that students show financial need. These programs are open to any student with the desire to work and who meets basic criteria of at least half-time enrollment and a 2.0 GPA. Wages, hours, and duties for student jobs vary depending upon the employer and upon the work program. For information about on- and off-campus student jobs and how to apply, go to the SFA Web site, <http://www.sfa.ufl.edu/job.html>. Also, see Chapter 3.

AID “PACKAGES”

Students who complete a *Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)* (see “How to Apply” below) and list UF as a “college of choice” are considered for all aid programs administered by SFA. One or more of the various types of aid (scholarships, grants, loans, and part-time employment) are usually offered to eligible students to make up their financial aid package.

SOURCES OF AID

SFA coordinates your total financial aid package. Financial aid packages may include aid from programs in any of the following categories:

1. Office for Student Financial Affairs Administered Aid. See Chapter 3.
2. Admissions Office and Other Academic Scholarships. See Chapter 4.
3. State of Florida Programs. See Chapter 5.
4. College-Awarded Aid. See Chapters 7 and 8.
5. Other Scholarships, Loans, & Sources of Aid. See Chapter 9.

ELIGIBILITY

Eligibility requirements vary by program. However, to be eligible for most financial aid programs you must

1. be enrolled at least half time
2. be a citizen or permanent resident of the United States
3. demonstrate financial need
4. not be in default on a student loan or owe a refund on student financial aid
5. maintain satisfactory academic progress (see “Financial Aid Academic Progress Requirements” in this chapter).

UF ADMISSION & CATALOGS

Although you must be accepted for enrollment at UF before you *receive* financial aid, you should *apply* for aid before being admitted. For admission applications, go to <http://www.admissions.ufl.edu>.

Undergraduate Catalogs are available on the Admissions Web site, <http://www.admissions.ufl.edu>, or for purchase from the UF Bookstore & Welcome Center, 1-800-226-3015, Museum Rd. & Reitz Union Drive, P. O. Box 118450, Gainesville, FL 32611. UF's *Graduate Catalog* is available online at <http://gradschool.rgp.ufl.edu/students/catalog.html>.

HOW TO APPLY

To be considered for financial aid at UF, you must apply by completing the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)*, meeting all deadlines, and complying with any requests from our office for additional documentation. The federal processor will analyze your data and send us the results.

Applying early and following up on your application is the best way to make sure you receive the assistance you may qualify for in time to begin school. Respond right away to requests from SFA and other processing agencies.

Complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

To apply for financial aid as an undergraduate or graduate at UF, you must complete and file a FAFSA as soon as possible after (not before) January 1 each year.

Apply Online. We encourage all students to apply online using FAFSA *on the WEB*. This online application not only saves time, but also offers instant editing of your application, helping to prevent errors.

Apply Online Use FAFSA on the Web!

Use FAFSA *on the Web* to apply online for student financial aid. This U.S. Department of Education (USDOE) Web application can save you time. You can also make online corrections to your FAFSA after you submit it. Using it is easy. Go to <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>.

SFA has a supply of FAFSA *on the Web* “Worksheets” in our lobby at S-107 Criser Hall. These worksheets are only to be used as a practice sheet before entering your information online. Worksheets are **NOT** accepted by the federal processor as a substitute for the electronic or paper FAFSA.

Paper FAFSAs. If you decide to file a paper FAFSA, you can request one from the federal government by calling the following toll-free number: 1-800-433-3243; OR download and print a PDF FAFSA from the Federal Student Aid Web site, <http://www.federalstudentaid.ed.gov>.

Take special care when you complete your FAFSA. It is the cornerstone of the application process, providing the federal need analysis processor with your important financial data. Completing it carelessly or filing it late may make you ineligible for aid you need to attend UF.

Apply by mid-February to meet UF's “on-time” application deadline. We must receive your FAFSA need analysis report with a valid “Estimated Family Contribution” from the federal need analysis processor by the **March 15, 2009** deadline, or your application will be processed as “late,” and you may not be considered for all aid programs. Apply several weeks before this date to meet the deadline. Financial aid is awarded first-come, first-served. Late applicants are considered for aid that remains when their application file is complete.

Federal Pell Grants

The U.S. Department of Education determines eligibility for Federal Pell Grants from information provided by students on their FAFSA. Undergraduates who complete the FAFSA will be automatically considered for a Federal Pell Grant (and all other federal grant programs for which they may be eligible). See Chapter 3 for a full description of this program.

Florida Student Assistance Grants

Eligibility for Florida Student Assistance Grants (FSAG) is determined by SFA according to guidelines established by the Office of Student Financial Assistance in Tallahassee. Priority is given to Florida residents who meet the UF March 15 “on-time” financial aid application deadline.



Your Federal & State PINs

Your PINs are your “Personal Identification Numbers” that function as your electronic signatures and identifiers. There are separate PINs for federal student aid and State of Florida programs. Be sure to use the appropriate PIN. **YOU WILL USE THEM YEAR AFTER YEAR.** Keep this information in a safe place.

Your Federal PIN

Your federal PIN is your electronic identifier and signature and allows you access to personal information in various U.S. Department of Education (USDOE) systems.

You can use your Federal PIN to:

1. access *FAFSA on the Web*
2. sign your *FAFSA* electronically or obtain a copy of your *FAFSA* information
3. complete your Federal Direct Student Loan electronic *Master Promissory Notes*
4. make online corrections to your *FAFSA*
5. review your grant and loan history on the National Student Loan Data System.

You can request a PIN, request a replacement PIN, or update your PIN mailing address at the USDOE's PIN Site, <http://www.pin.ed.gov>.

Your State of Florida PIN

If you receive a Florida Bright Futures (FBFS) award from the State of Florida, you will also receive a System ID and Personal Identification Number (PIN) with instructions on how to access your Bright Futures record on the Web. Use these to:

1. view your State of Florida award
2. update your demographic information
3. update your college choice
4. complete your Perkins Loan *Master Promissory Notes*
5. view the amount disbursed each semester
6. monitor your hours remaining for the year and for the scholarship
7. view a list of correspondence sent to you by the FBFS Program.

For questions, call 1-888-827-2004. FBFS information is available at <http://www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org/ssfad>.

When you fill out the *FAFSA*:

1. **READ:** Carefully read the online instructions or those in the *FAFSA* booklet.
2. **Florida Student Assistance Grant (FSAG):** To apply, be sure to list the University of Florida and **UF's correct Federal School Code—001535**—in Step 6, “Colleges to Receive Information.”
3. **SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER:** Be sure you have entered your Social Security number correctly. An incorrect Social Security number will delay your aid.
4. **SIGNATURES:** Be sure **all** required signatures are completed. Sign your electronic *FAFSA* with a Federal Student Aid PIN. If you do not have a PIN, go to <http://www.pin.ed.gov>.

• Reapply Each Year

You **must** reapply for aid each year by updating your financial information and status. To make the process easier, *FAFSA on the Web* has some of your information from the previous year already entered for you. Go to <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov> and select “Filling out a *FAFSA*.”

• Financial Aid History & NSLDS

SFA will confirm each student's prior financial aid history information through the National Student Loan Data System (NSLDS) for all students who attend or have attended another postsecondary school, regardless of whether or not they received financial aid. If SFA is unable to obtain the required information, we will notify you that you must pursue this matter directly. The NSLDS Web address is <http://www.nsls.ed.gov>.

Dual enrollment students who have jointly attended a high school and a community college as part of their high school programs must also have any prior financial aid history confirmed through NSLDS before their funds are released.

AFTER YOU APPLY. . . What to Expect

You will receive responses from SFA and other agencies.

1. **The Federal Student Aid Report (SAR)** The federal processor will send you an SAR, paper or by e-mail, after receiving your *FAFSA*. The SAR indicates your expected family

Your UFID & GatorLink

Your UFID (University of Florida Identification Number) is assigned to you by UF. The UFID is your primary identifier for all your UF records and transactions. It will be printed on your Gator 1 ID card.

You can get your UFID online by going to <http://www.ufid.ufl.edu>.

You will use your UFID to conduct UF business. For instance, you will use it in conjunction with your GatorLink ID and password to access my.UFL and ISIS.

If you do not have a GatorLink account, go to <http://www.gatorlink.ufl.edu>.

Your UFID vs. Your Social Security Number (SSN). Please note that when you apply for financial aid you will also be asked for your Social Security Number. Your SSN does not function as your ID at UF; however, it is required by the federal government to process your financial aid application.

Social Security No.

Your Social Security no. is the primary identifier on all your federal records, including the *FAFSA*. Be sure it is correct on all forms.



Apply Weeks Early to Meet the March 15 “On-Time” Deadline

- Send your *FAFSA* to the federal processor as soon as possible AFTER January 1.
- Apply for financial aid at the same time, or even before, you apply for admission.
- We must receive the results of your *FAFSA* with a valid “Estimated Family Contribution” from the federal need analysis processor by March 15 for your application to be considered “on time.” Apply several weeks before this date to be sure the federal processor has time to send us your results before the deadline. Late applicants are considered only for aid that remains when their aid application file is complete.

contribution, which is used to determine your eligibility for financial aid. If you apply online and provide your e-mail address, you will receive an online SAR as soon as 24 hours after your FAFSA is processed. When you receive the SAR, review it for accuracy. To make corrections, follow the instructions on the paper SAR, or make corrections electronically at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>.

2. Verification Your application may be selected for "verification," the federally required process of checking accuracy of information students supply on aid applications. See "Federal Verification."

3. Notification of Aid Award

When UF receives your application information from the federal processor and you have been admitted to UF, SFA will award you an aid package based on your demonstrated need. SFA will send you a *Financial Aid Award Letter* stating the terms and conditions of aid programs awarded. Carefully read the information accompanying your award and follow all instructions. Only "first time in college" students receive the initial award letter in paper form through the U.S. mail. All other award notifications and other correspondence will be sent to you by e-mail. See "SFA E-mail Correspondence."

4. Federal Direct Loan and Federal Perkins Loan Promissory Notes & Loan Acceptance

If you are awarded a Federal Direct Loan or Federal Perkins Loan as part of your aid package and do not already have a *Master Promissory Note* (MPN) on file, you will need to complete an online MPN. Promissory notes are also required for certain other loans. Federal Direct Loan and Federal Perkins Loan borrowers must also confirm online that they want each loan awarded to them. See "Student Loans" in Chapter 3 for information.

FEDERAL VERIFICATION

Each year, about thirty percent of students' financial aid applications nationwide are chosen for "verification," a process of confirming data supplied by the applicant and/or their parents. UF also must resolve discrepancies on students' financial aid applications. UF participates in the federal Quality Assurance (QA) Program, a federal

program that allows the university to establish its own verification criteria and determine which student files must be verified. If your application is chosen for a QA review, we will notify you.

If your application is selected for verification, or if there are discrepancies on your application information, we will send you an e-mail alerting you to check your "Financial Aid Status" on UF's ISIS system to determine what documents to provide. **Do not submit any documents unless we ask you to do so.** Aid funds cannot be disbursed to you until you submit all requested documents and the accuracy of your information has been checked. This can take four weeks or longer.

NOTE: Students who receive financial aid based on incorrect information may be required to pay it back. Anyone who intentionally gives false or misleading information on aid applications may be subject to a fine of \$10,000, receive a prison sentence, or both.

Your Responsibilities If Selected for Verification:

1. Quickly submit all requested verification documents to SFA.
2. Keep in touch with your parents throughout the verification process, if you are a dependent student.
3. Keep your mailing address, phone number, and e-mail address current with the UF Directory through ISIS.

HOW TO TRANSFER FINANCIAL AID

Generally, financial aid cannot be transferred from one institution to another during the academic year. In most cases you must reapply for aid. Some tips if you plan to transfer to UF:

1. Contact both SFA and the financial aid office at your current school for transfer policies.
2. Be sure that UF (Federal Code 001535) is listed on your *Federal Student Aid Report* (SAR) as a "School to Receive Results" when you receive it from the processor.
3. If you are receiving a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship or other aid from the State of Florida, contact the Florida Department of Education in Tallahassee at 1-888-827-2004.
4. If you are receiving a Federal Direct Loan/Federal Family Education Loan at your current school, you must cancel that loan, reapply at SFA, and contact

4. Photocopies or printouts of all financial aid correspondence and forms, your federal income tax returns and W-2s, and your completed FAFSA
5. Borrower copies of promissory notes
6. Your Federal PIN
7. Your State of Florida PIN and paperwork



★ SFA E-mail Correspondence

Once registered, you will receive important financial aid business correspondence at your GatorLink e-mail address. Check your GatorLink e-mail daily. Financial aid e-mails may include: financial aid award notices; follow-up letters; direct loan correspondence (re: loan acceptance, promissory notes, and entrance counseling); academic progress notifications; verification notifications; and requests for additional documentation.

To get a GatorLink e-mail address, go to <http://www.gatorlink.ufl.edu>. Be sure your GatorLink e-mail address is correctly configured to receive SFA and UF business correspondence.

★ What is ISIS?

ISIS is UF's Integrated Student Information System, available on the Web at <http://www.isis.ufl.edu>.

ISIS is the main way to get information about your financial aid, documents still needed to complete your file, your deferment status, and your disbursement status. On ISIS, look under "Financial Aid."

You will also be referred to ISIS through SFA e-mail correspondence.

Also use ISIS to update your mailing address and phone number, accept your federal loans, complete Direct Loan Entrance Counseling, and sign up for Direct Deposit.

all your previous lenders to update your enrollment status and address.

REPORTING OUTSIDE AID

You must inform us of money or aid you receive that is not listed on your *Financial Aid Award Letter* from any organization other than our office (such as tuition fee waivers, fellowships, private or state scholarships, Florida Prepaid, UF colleges or departments, or any awards paid directly to you).

If your award letter does not list any such aid, you must list the type and amount on UF's ISIS Web site at <http://www.isis.ufl.edu> using the "Additional Aid Reporting" option. Submit this information only once; then wait to receive a notification of your revised award notice via e-mail from us. Check the new award to confirm that all changes were made correctly.

Certain programs **require repayment** if you receive aid in excess of your demonstrated eligibility for aid. Report outside resources early. Don't find yourself in a situation of having to repay funds when you can't afford it.

SUMMER FINANCIAL AID

An academic year at UF consists of fall, spring, and summer semesters. Freshmen and sophomores entering the State University System must complete at least nine credit hours during a summer session to graduate. For exemptions, see <http://www.registrar.ufl.edu/catalog/policies/regulationgraduation.html>. SFA supports this requirement, and summer money may be offered if

1. federal or institutional funds remain for summer awards after fall and spring semester needs are met
2. you choose to use aid originally awarded for the fall or spring term during the summer.

See Chapter 2, for enrollment requirements for receiving aid.

**STUDENT'S STATUS—
Dependent or Independent?**

The federal government has established very specific criteria for classifying financial aid recipients as dependent or independent. This classification is important, as it determines *whose* financial information must be reported on the *FAFSA*.

If you are able to check "YES" to any item in Step Three on the 2009-10 *FAFSA*, you are considered *independent* for financial aid purposes. If classified independent, your need is evaluated on your own and, if applicable, in conjunction with your spouse's income and assets.

If you are classified *dependent*, your own assets and income are considered as well as your parents' assets and income when your financial need is determined.

Federal criteria of dependence/independence are extremely specific and can be confusing. See Step Three (questions 48-58) of the *FAFSA* for more information and help. In addition, *FAFSA's* Web site has an online Dependency Status Worksheet to assist you in determining your status.

HOW YOUR NEED IS DETERMINED

For financial aid purposes, need is determined by the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} &\text{Costs of Attendance} \\ &- \text{Family Contribution} \\ &= \text{Need} \end{aligned}$$

The following explanations of college costs and family contribution may clarify these terms.

Costs of Attendance

Financial aid must be used only for expenses directly related to your education. College costs include the following: tuition/fees, books and supplies, computer costs, housing, meals, transportation, clothing maintenance, personal, and health insurance.

SFA calculates budgets (see "2009-10

Estimated Costs of Attendance") for undergraduate and graduate students, on-campus and off-campus.

Student budgets can only include costs of attendance for the individual student. Additional living allowances for married students or students with children are not included. A standard child care allowance may be included, however, depending on the ages of the student's children.

Following is a brief description of how these budgets are derived. Budgets are based on a two-semester academic year and vary according to academic classification and residency status.

1. **Tuition/Fees.** Fees for undergraduate students are based on an average of 30 credit hours of 0-4999 level courses. Graduate tuition fees are based on 24 class hours from 5000-9999. Graduate students in dentistry, medicine, and veterinary medicine pay block fees. For Tuition Fees, see page 12.
2. **Books and Supplies.** Costs are determined by averaging the total cost of books and supplies for a four-year accounting curriculum at the UF Bookstore (with 25% of books purchased used at 75% of new book price, and assuming resale of 50% of texts at 50% of cost).
3. **Computer Costs.** Computer costs built into student budgets are "annualized." This means the figure is derived from one year's monthly costs for purchase or lease of equipment (including printer) and annual software purchases/upgrades. The costs are figured over a two-year period.
4. **Housing.** Housing costs for undergraduate students living on

campus are based on costs of living in an air-conditioned double room for ten months (utilities and refrigerator rental allowance included). On-campus graduates' costs are based on an average of rents for available graduate housing. Off-campus costs are derived from averaging rates quoted by phone survey of local apartment complexes. Rents are assumed to pay for water, sewage, and refuse collection. Allowances are made for phone service, long distance, and utilities.

5. **Food.** Food costs for on- and off-campus students are based on costs of meals established by the U.S. Department of Labor. Food costs for students living with parents are based on state meal reimbursement rates.
6. **Transportation.** On- and off-campus transportation costs allow for three round-trips to Miami per two semesters.
7. **Personal/Health Insurance.** The personal budget is based on the U.S. Department of Labor's established personal costs. Health insurance costs are based on literature from UF's Insurance Director and Committee Chairperson.
8. **Clothing Maintenance.** The budget for clothing maintenance is based on the U.S. Department of Labor's established clothing maintenance costs.

Family Contribution

As stated earlier, *parents' contribution + student's contribution = expected family contribution*. Family contribution is the amount you and your family are expected to contribute toward your college costs. Your family's total income and financial situation are taken into account in determining financial need.

Parental Contribution

In determining parental contribution, deductions are made for parents' employment costs; living expenses, such as food, clothing, and housing; and the amount of taxes paid. Also considered are family size, number of family members attending college or other postsecondary schools, number of parents working, and the elder parent's age. In general, parents and students are expected to pay as much of the educational costs as they reasonably can afford.

Student Contribution. Students are expected to help pay their educational

costs from resources they have, such as savings, income, benefits, or employment. After analyzing all student income and assets available, a determination of the student contribution is made. There may be instances when no student contribution is required.

Married couples are considered for aid individually; if both spouses are students, each should apply for financial aid separately. Both spouses are expected to contribute toward joint expenses, regardless of student or employment status.

FINANCIAL AID ACADEMIC PROGRESS REQUIREMENTS

UF students receiving financial aid are required to be in good standing and maintain satisfactory academic progress. To be eligible to receive financial aid, students must comply with the following conditions.

I. Undergraduates

- A. Qualitative Measure of Progress
 1. Students must have a cumulative 2.0 grade point average by the end of 60 attempted academic credit hours and must maintain at least a cumulative 2.0 grade point average throughout their undergraduate enrollment. Students failing to meet this requirement will be suspended from receiving financial aid until they meet the requirement.
 2. Until the completion of 60 academic credit hours, students' progress for financial aid purposes will be evaluated under the same standards approved by the University Senate for determining eligibility for continued enrollment:
 - a. Students who have from .5 to 14.5 grade points less than a 2.0 cumulative grade point average will be placed on financial aid probation.
 - b. Students who have 15 or more grade points less than a 2.0 cumulative grade point average will be suspended from financial aid for one term.
 - c. Students who do not reduce their grade point deficit to less than 15 deficit grade points the following term of enrollment will be terminated from financial aid.
 - d. Students who reduce their grade point deficit to less than 15 grade points below a 2.0 cumulative grade point average will return to

- probationary status.
3. Any action taken by the UF Senate Committee on Student Petitions regarding students' appeals of suspended enrollment because of grade point deficit (for students who have not yet earned 60 credit hours) will also apply to the financial aid component of the academic progress policy.
- B. Time Frame for Completing Degree Objectives
 1. Students will not be eligible for aid if they do not earn a baccalaureate degree after attempting 150 credit hours (whether or not they received aid for all terms), with the following exception:
 2. Students may attempt up to 160 credit hours for programs that regularly require more than 120 earned hours to achieve a baccalaureate degree.
- C. Measurements of Progress within Time Frame
 1. All students, regardless of classification, must earn 75% of all hours attempted.
 2. Students who do not earn 75% of all credit hours attempted will be placed on financial aid probation for one term. During the following term of enrollment, these students must raise their percentage of credit hours earned to the specified minimum. Students who do not will be suspended from aid until they meet this standard.

II. Postbaccalaureate Students

Students enrolled in postbaccalaureate studies must petition the Academic Progress Appeals Committee to continue to receive financial aid. Postbaccalaureate students must meet the same academic requirements as undergraduates, as specified under I.A.1. above. The types of financial aid available to postbaccalaureate students will depend on the student's degree-seeking status.

III. Graduate Students

Since many courses require research projects that take more than a semester to complete, grades of "I" are routinely posted until the coursework has been finished. Therefore, the following satisfactory progress standards have been designed to take this grading practice into account.

- A. Qualitative Measure of Progress

Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average or meet academic standards required by their departments, whichever is higher.
- B. Time Frame for Completing Degree Objectives

Students will be ineligible for aid if they do not attain their degree objectives after attempting the maximum number of credit hours listed below (whether or not they have received aid for all terms):

1. 70 credit hours at the graduate level for a master's degree program.
 2. 164 credit hours at the graduate level for a doctor of pharmacy degree.
 3. 100 credit hours at the graduate level for a specialist's degree program (including master's degree hours).
 4. 120 credit hours at the graduate level for a doctoral degree program (including master's degree hours).
- C. Measurements of Progress within Time Frame
1. Students must earn 75% of credit hours attempted at the graduate level.
 2. Students who do not earn 75% of credit hours attempted will be on financial aid probation for one term. During the following term of enrollment these students must raise their percentage of credit hours earned to the minimum. If they do not, they will be suspended from aid until they meet the standard.

IV. Law Students

- A. Qualitative Measure of Progress
Students must maintain a 2.0 minimum cumulative grade point average, or meet academic standards required by the College of Law, whichever is higher.
- B. Time Frame for Completing Degree Objectives
1. Students will be ineligible for aid if they do not attain their degree objective after attempting the maximum credit hours listed below (whether or not they received aid for those terms):
 - a. 45 credit hours at the graduate level for students enrolled in the Master of Laws in Taxation Program.
 - b. 100 credit hours at the graduate level for students enrolled in the Juris Doctor Program.
- C. Measurements of Progress within Time Frame
Students will be evaluated each term for eligibility to enroll the following term.

V. Professional Students in the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Veterinary Medicine

- A. Qualitative Measure of Progress
Since professional schools use a nontraditional grading system (one

not based upon grade point average) to assess satisfactory completion of course work, the same policy (a similar nontraditional approach) will be used to measure qualitative progress for continuing financial aid eligibility.

- B. Time Frame for Completing Degree Objectives
Students must earn their degrees within four years.
- C. Measurements of Progress within Time Frame
1. Students will be evaluated annually in September to determine advancement to the next class level.
 2. Students who do not advance to the next class level but are still eligible for enrollment will be on financial aid probation for the following year. Students who have not advanced to the next class level by the end of the probationary period will no longer be eligible for financial aid.

VI. Additional Policies Which Apply to All Students

- A. Treatment of Course Withdrawals, Incompletes, Course Repetitions, and Remedial Courses
1. Treatment of course withdrawals, incompletes, and course repetitions will conform to the academic standards for the University of Florida for determining grade point average.
 2. Remedial courses are not offered at the University of Florida.
- B. Appeals
Students who think extenuating circumstances have contributed to their failure to maintain satisfactory academic progress may petition the Academic Progress Appeals Committee for reassessment of their status.

VII. Other Categories

Students enrolled in curricula not specifically addressed in this policy must petition the Academic Progress Appeals Committee to continue to receive financial aid.

YOUR RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

As a student consumer, you have the right to:

- ✓ be informed of the correct procedures for applying for aid, cost of attendance, aid programs available, how financial need is determined, criteria for awarding aid, how academic progress is determined, and what you must do to continue receiving aid

- ✓ be informed of the type and amount of assistance you will receive, how much of your need has been met, and how and when you will be paid
- ✓ appeal financial aid office decisions with regard to your application
- ✓ view the contents of your financial aid file, in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act
- ✓ know the conditions of any loan you accept
- ✓ know the job description and pay rate for any student job you accept or for which you apply.

It is your responsibility to:

- ✓ complete and submit applications correctly and on time
- ✓ read and understand all materials sent to you from SFA and other financial aid agencies or provided on the SFA Web site; keep copies of all forms and materials you sign and send in
- ✓ know and comply with the rules governing aid you receive
- ✓ provide all documentation and information requested by SFA
- ✓ comply with the provisions of any promissory note and all other agreements you sign
- ✓ register for the number of hours required for your aid disbursement (<http://www.sfa.ufl.edu/receiving/enroll.html>)
- ✓ maintain satisfactory academic progress (<http://www.sfa.ufl.edu/receiving/academicprogress.html>)
- ✓ notify SFA of all resources not listed on your award letter (see *Reporting Outside Aid*)
- ✓ use aid only for educational expenses related to attending UF
- ✓ check your GatorLink e-mail often for financial aid business e-mail
- ✓ keep your local home mailing, permanent mailing addresses, e-mail address, and phone number up to date in the University Directory. Sign on to my.UFL and select "My Account," then "Update My Directory Profile."

CONFIDENTIALITY OF STUDENT RECORDS

UF ensures the confidentiality of student records in accordance with State University System rules, state statutes, and the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974—Buckley Amendment. Your family financial information and the type and amount of your aid are held in the

strictest confidence.

Information is released only with your written consent.

CHANGES IN FAMILY CIRCUMSTANCES/PETITIONS

Check with your financial aid adviser immediately if you believe extenuating family circumstances, such as the following, might affect your financial aid application:

1. Divorce of parents, or you from your spouse
2. Death or disability of a major wage earner
3. Loss of employment of a major wage earner
4. Loss of other income or benefits (such as Social Security or child support), by you, your parents, or spouse

March 1–June 1 is the time period to petition your financial aid award.

The workload at SFA when you file a petition will determine the response time to the appeal. All actions resulting from the petition process are contingent upon fund availability and any processing deadlines which may be in effect at the time of petition approval.

WITHDRAWALS & REFUNDS

Withdrawals

Students who wish to withdraw must follow UF's official withdrawal policy. The Dean of Students Office assists students who wish to withdraw from UF and coordinates the process. To begin, visit P-202 Peabody Hall and complete a withdrawal form.

Withdrawing from classes will effect your percentage of hours earned. All students must earn 75% of all hours attempted to remain eligible for financial aid. Complete information is included on SFA's Web site, <http://www.sfa.ufl.edu/receiving/ufwithdrawal.html>.

If you officially withdraw or stop attending all courses, you may be required to repay all or part of the financial aid disbursed to

you for the term in which you withdraw.

Students receiving federal funds may be required to repay aid determined to be "unearned." The earned/unearned calculation is based on the percentage of days attended during the term in which you withdrew. The amount you have earned is determined on a pro-rata basis. That is, if you completed 30% of the term in which you withdrew, you earn have earned 30% of the federal aid you received. Once you have completed 60% of the term, you are considered to have earned all of your aid.

The difference between your earned federal aid and 100% equals the percentage of unearned federal funds that are subject to repayment. Federal regulations require Title IV aid to be refunded in the following order:

1. Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans
2. Federal Direct Subsidized Stafford Loans
3. Federal Perkins Loans
4. Federal TEACH Grant
5. Federal Direct Graduate PLUS Loans
6. Federal Direct PLUS Loans (for parents)
7. Federal Pell Grants
8. Federal Academic Competitiveness Grants (ACG)
9. National SMART Grants
10. Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants

For grants, the law provides that you return 50% of any grant you receive requiring repayment. Any amount you do have to return is a grant overpayment, and you must arrange with UF or the U.S. Department of Education to return the funds.

Please Note:

(1) You may also be required to repay other federal, state, institutional, or private student financial aid programs based on the terms and conditions associated with those programs.

(2) UF is required to return to the applicable federal program account the unearned percentage of institutional charges (tuition, fees, on-campus housing). UF may bill you for any funds returned on your behalf, including loan funds.

(3) UF's tuition refund policy is separate from the federal requirement to return unearned aid. Whether or not you receive a tuition/fee refund has no bearing on the amount you must repay under this formula.

Refunds

If, as a result of withdrawal, cancellation, or termination of attendance, you are

entitled to a refund of tuition/fees (determined by University Financial Services) or campus housing charges (determined by the Division of Housing and Residence Education) and you received aid for the same payment period, part of your refund will be returned to the appropriate federal Title IV or institutional account. Any amount remaining after accounts from which you received aid have been reimbursed will be returned to you.

TAXATION OF AID PROGRAMS

Any funds you receive from scholarships, benefits, fellowships, and grants from UF or any other source that, combined, exceed the cost of tuition, fees, books, and required equipment and supplies, are considered taxable income. This includes Federal Pell Grants, but not UF or federal loans. You are responsible for keeping records and completing your tax forms properly. You may want to keep a receipt file of educational purchases. For more detailed information, consult the IRS, your income tax form instruction booklet, or your personal tax adviser.

ANTI-DRUG ABUSE ACT

2. Money Matters

The key to successfully managing your money is planning. It is essential that you plan how you will spend your money. If you don't, you may find yourself in a very difficult position as the year passes. Controlling your spending through budgeting requires planning, discipline, and a basic understanding of simple budgeting techniques.



BASIC BUDGETING

Step 1—Calculate Your Projected Income.

Begin by estimating the amount of money you will have to cover your expenses for the semester. Potential income sources may include:

- ✓ Your savings
- ✓ Earnings from a part-time job
- ✓ Financial aid awarded
- ✓ Parental contribution
- ✓ Benefits

Step 2—List Fixed Expenses. Fixed expenses are those that do not vary, such as tuition and fees. Ask yourself if you have any control over the cost of the item or service. List the item as a fixed expense only if the answer is no. The university develops standard budgets for categories of students within the school's population (see "How Your Need is Determined," Chapter 1). You can use these sample budgets as a guide to estimate your costs, here and in Step 3.

Step 3—List Variable Expenses.

Variable expenses are subject to a certain amount of control. They can be obtained at varying costs, and in some cases you can do without them.

Examples are:

- ✓ Housing and meals
- ✓ Books and supplies
- ✓ Computer costs
- ✓ Transportation
- ✓ Personal expenses
- ✓ Insurance
- ✓ Clothing maintenance

Step 4—Total Expenses. Add your fixed expenses to your variable expenses to obtain your "total expenses."

Step 5—Balancing Your Budget.

Subtract your total expenses (Step 4) from your projected income (Step 1). If your estimated expenses are higher than your projected income, see "Cutting Costs" for ways to reduce your spending.

Cutting Costs

If your costs are out of line with your income, the solution lies in your variable expenses (Step 3). Try the following cost-cutting suggestions:

Housing & Meals

- Compare costs of living on campus with living off campus.
- Estimate the cost of utilities in each housing option.
- Consider living at home.
- Compare costs of cooking or restaurants with meal plan.

Books & Supplies

Consider buying used books or checking out supplementary texts from the library.

Transportation

- Don't bring a car to school.
- Invest in a bicycle.
- Ride the local city bus. It's free with your Gator 1 Card.
- When traveling home, compare airfare with bus and train fare.

Clothing/Personal/Insurance

- Limit clothing purchases to basics.
- Patronize second-hand clothing stores.
- Compare prices and buy sale items.
- Take advantage of campus insurance.

PLANNING FOR THE SEMESTER

When planning for the semester, you need to keep in mind: (1) the source of your money (savings, parents, financial aid, part-time work), and (2) when it will arrive, or be available (lump sum, installments, or beginning of semester).

If money comes from home, it may be best to receive it in monthly installments. Students who have a lump sum of available cash to last throughout the semester (for instance, from a student loan) must learn to budget it over four months. On the other hand, part-time jobs provide steady income. Money from some financial aid programs is not available at the beginning of the term, and students should be prepared to pay immediate expenses from other sources.

START-UP COSTS

Use the following "Start-Up Costs Worksheet" to estimate how much cash you'll need when you arrive on campus.

Step one is checking off items already paid. Step two is listing deferments—some items can be deferred for students who meet eligibility requirements. Students whose fees or housing costs

have been deferred can check off these items. All other expenses go in the "Still Need" column. The total amount in the "Still Need" column is the amount you should have available to cover start-up costs.

Because of possible delays in arrival of funds from state and federal programs, students awarded financial aid should bring enough money with them in the fall to cover at least a full month's expenses.

See "Estimated Costs of Attendance" in Chapter 1 and the following descriptions for an explanation of how we determine estimated costs. **Due to early printing, cost information is subject to change for 2009-10.**

TUITION/FEES: Fees are due at the end of the second week of classes. You will not receive a bill. To figure fees, see "Calculation of Fees" on the following pages. University Financial Services (UFS) accepts cash, personal checks, cashier's checks, electronic funds transfer, money orders, debit/ATM cards, Visa, MasterCard, and American Express. Also, see <http://www.fa.ufl.edu/ufs/cashiers/paymethods.asp>.

HOUSING: On-campus housing costs for the entire fall semester must be paid by August 1. The on-campus figure listed is an average for an air-conditioned, double room with one roommate and includes utilities and refrigerator rental. Off-campus costs include a student's share of a local apartment; allowances are included for telephone service and utility costs.

OFF-CAMPUS SECURITY DEPOSITS, HOOK-UP

Following are general costs of security deposits for utilities. Gainesville Regional Utilities: electric, gas, and water—\$200, gas only—\$50, electric and gas or electric only—\$150; plus a \$15–\$35 service charge (\$20 same-day service); Bell South (off-campus)—\$45 minimum for hook-up; deposits based on overall credit and previous phone history.

BOOKS: The UF Bookstores accept cash, checks with an ID, MasterCard, Visa, American Express, and Discover. A Textbook Deferred Payment Program is also available to qualified students. See <http://www.bsd.ufl.edu/G1C/bookstore/bookstore.asp>. Students can also "shop around" (Florida Bookstore, Goering's, T.I.S. College Bookstore, etc.).

MEALS: Meal costs for students are based on costs of meals as established by the U.S. Department of Labor. Declining Balance Accounts and several Meal Plans are available from Gator Dining Services at <http://www.gatordining.com>, (352) 392-2491. Meal plans for Spring 2008-09 ranged from \$1,360–\$1,815 per semester (fall/spring), tax included. Gator Dining Services accepts checks, Visa, MasterCard, and American Express. A Financial Aid Deferred Payment Program is also available. Go to the Gator Dining Web site for more information.

MISCELLANEOUS: Students should bring enough money to cover personal expenses such as clothing, laundry, transportation and recreation for several months. See "Estimated Costs of Attendance" in Chapter 1 and "Optional Expenses" below for

estimates of these types of expenses.

OPTIONAL EXPENSES

The following expenses will give you an idea of the types of costs you should consider when making up a budget. **Due to early printing, figures are subject to change.**

1. **UF Parking Decal:** \$61 per semester; \$122 per year (three semesters). Motorcycle—\$64 per year; \$32 per semester. (07-08 rates)
2. **Refrigerator Rental:** small (3.0 cu. ft.)—\$60 for a year; large (5.0 cu. ft.)—\$70 for a year; Combination Unit (fridge/freezer/microwave)—\$170; \$25 deposits.
3. **Laundry:** \$1.25 for washer (26 minutes) and \$1.25 for dryer (46 minutes) per load in Residence Halls.
4. **Residence Hall Activities:** free check cashing in the area government offices, equipment checkout (vacuum cleaners, blenders, etc.), and residence area social activities such as movies, concerts, and barbecues, with activity card.
5. **Campus Bus/Regional Transit:** free with Gator 1 Card.
6. **Athletic events with no season pass:** football, \$10 for UF students; basketball is free with UFID.
7. **Athletic events with a season pass:** football, \$70 per student, \$224 general; general public season basketball tickets \$370.
8. **Homecoming—Gator Growl,** \$15 for students and spouses; \$20 for student guests.
9. **Theaters:** \$40/semester (\$8 at local theaters; JWRU movies free with UFID); Constans Theatre: \$11 for

UNIVERSITY POLICIES ABOUT MONEY

Service Indicators

The university places "service indicators" on student records for outstanding debts for tuition, parking tickets, housing, infirmary charges, library fines, returned checks, loan repayment problems, etc. A service indicator prevents further academic progress. With a service indicator on their records, students cannot receive grades or transcripts, register for another term, receive a diploma, or use many university services. If the Registrar's Office informs you that you have a financial service indicator on your records, use ISIS to find out about debts (amounts due and source and type of debt). You may also go to University Financial Services (UFS) at S-113 Criser Hall to learn the reason for the service indicator and clear your records. To prevent a service indicator on records, pay university bills promptly.

Fee Payment/UF Bills

Students may view and print detailed tuition statements and other detailed account information through the my.UFL system, in addition to making payment. Student's accounts on ISIS provide links to pay electronically (ePay) and instructions to pay by mail. Check with UFS on their Web site, <http://fa.ufl.edu/ufs>, or at S-113 Criser

Hall for complete and up-to-date information on your UF accounts.

All payments other than tuition are due on the first of the month. Tuition fee payments are due by the established tuition fee payment deadline for each term and are not billed before the deadline.

Deferments

The university may permit deferment of tuition and fees for students receiving aid from federal or state programs if such aid is scheduled for disbursement after the fee payment deadline. A fee deferment will appear as positive "service indicators" on your UF accounts. Deferments are automatically granted to eligible financial aid recipients against financial aid they have been awarded. Deferments are posted about one week before the semester begins. To see if your fees have been deferred, use ISIS, myUFL or check with your financial aid adviser. Students who do not receive a deferment and think they may be eligible should check with SFA.

Veterans. Fee deferments are also issued to veterans and to some dependents of veterans who receive educational benefits. Applying late for financial aid may jeopardize eligibility for a fee deferment.

Housing. Questions about deferments for UF housing should be addressed to the UF Department of Housing and Residence Education, (352) 392-2161. To qualify, students must be receiving \$3,800 in verifiable financial aid for fall semester.

Students whose fees are deferred against financial aid must pay fees by the deferred fee payment deadline, whether or not their aid has arrived.

Direct Deposit of Financial Aid

UF offers the service of depositing your financial aid directly to your bank checking account. This process will not delay disbursement of your financial aid and saves trips to the bank. See "Sign Up for Direct Deposit." For more information, contact UFS in S-113 Criser Hall.

Late Fees*

UF charges a \$100 late fee for registering late and another \$100 late fee for paying fees after the deadline. Students may be charged one or both late fees. If you have a fee deferment,



SIGN UP FOR DIRECT DEPOSIT

Most students receive their financial aid from UFS by direct deposit of their aid funds into their bank checking accounts.

To sign up for Direct Deposit, go to myUFL, choose "My Campus Finances" and click on Student Direct Deposit or use UF's ISIS system on the Web, <http://www.isis.ufl.edu>. Go to "Financial Services," then choose "EFT Signup." Authorization is effective immediately. You can also use "EFT Sign Up" to update your banking information any time it changes.

you will be charged a late payment fee if you do not pay by the deferred payment deadline date.

Returned Payment Items/ Late Loan Repayment

Students whose paper or e-checks are returned or who dispute a credit card transaction for any reason or are late repaying loans may: (1) lose eligibility for paying debts by check and for short-term loans and other UF loans (Perkins, institutional loans); and (2) have aid disbursements withheld until they clear the check(s) and/or repay their loan in person at UFS, S-113 Criser. A \$25–\$40 fee is assessed for returned items based on the face value of the returned item.

Library Fines*

Overdue library book charges are 25 cents per day; minimum fine: \$1.00. UF will bill you for overdue charges. You cannot pay these fines when you return the books, but must wait for the bill.

Parking Fines*

If you purchase an on-campus parking decal, UF Traffic and Parking will provide you with a parking policy brochure. You MUST have a decal to park on campus. Tickets for parking violations range from \$10–\$250. If the UF Police Department has your car towed or places a lock on your wheel, you must pay \$50 plus outstanding tickets and tow charges to retrieve your car.

UF BOOKSTORES

Checks are accepted for amount of purchase with a photo ID. UF

Bookstores accept MasterCard, Visa, Discover, or American Express. Branch locations: Health Sciences Bookstore, Law School Bookstore, Veterinary Medicine Bookstore, and the Reitz Union Corner Store. For financial aid recipients who meet eligibility requirements, a Textbook Deferred Payment Program is available by application. See the Online Bookstore Web page, <http://www.bsd.ufl.edu/bookstore>.

LOCAL BANKING

Checking/Savings Accounts

For convenience, you may want to open a local checking or savings account or an account with a bank that participates in the Honor or Exchange Systems (computerized networks of banks, other financial institutions, and businesses that allow you to make deposits, withdrawals, and other financial transactions from automatic tellers at participating businesses).

Automatic Tellers

Automatic tellers are available on the ground floor of the Reitz Union for: Wachovia, Bank of America, and Campus USA Credit Union. Bank of America and Wachovia also have automatic tellers located on campus, which can be found in front of the HUB and at Gator Dining Corner. Students who participate in the Honor or Exchange systems may also use these machines.

CALCULATION OF FEES

Once the semester begins, students may determine their tuition fee debt on ISIS or my.UFL (view tuition statement).

2009-10 Tuition Fees

For Tuition and Fee information, go to the University Financial Services Web site, <http://fa.ufl.edu/ufs/cashiers/feeca.fc.asp>. University Financial Services is located in S-113 Criser Hall.

Fees are based on the total number of registered credits. The hourly rate is based on residency status, course level, and first enrolled term of the current degree.

Student Health Fee

The student health fee is included in both the rate per credit hour and the block fees figures. It includes professional office visits with the Student Health Care Center medical and nursing staff, except those with specialty personnel and special tests. Counseling sessions at the Infirmary's Mental Health Service are covered. UF strongly encourages students to investigate their family insurance coverage. Students may purchase the Student Government Sponsored Insurance group plan designed to cover most fee-for-service charges.

UF PAYMENT METHODS

Electronic Funds Transfer

may be used to make payments on tuition and other UF debts using ISIS. No service fee is charged.

MasterCard and American Express

may be used to make payments on tuition and other UF debts using ISIS, for a 2.6% fee.

Bank Debit/ATM card payments are accepted at the University Cashier's Office in S-113 Criser Hall.

Cash or money order payments

are also accepted at the University Cashier's Office (U.S. currency only).

Checks should be made out to the University of Florida and include the students name, UFID, and local address and phone number. Mail checks to: UFS, P. O. Box 114050, Gainesville, FL 32611-4050.

RECEIVING YOUR FINANCIAL AID

Enrollment Requirements

UF students must enroll at least half time to receive most types of financial aid benefits. Students who enroll less than full time may have their aid adjusted after the drop/add period. To receive funds through some State of Florida programs, students must enroll for at least 12 credit hours. Federal Pell Grant awards are prorated according to enrollment status. Please

Disbursement

Students generally receive their financial aid by direct deposit or by mail from University Financial Services (UFS), S-113 Criser Hall, after classes begin and as soon as aid is available. For students who do not sign up for direct deposit, UFS mails financial aid checks directly to the "local home mailing address" in the UF Directory. See also "Direct Deposit of Financial Aid" on previous page.

UFS disburses aid only after verifying enrollment status and making sure students have no financial or academic service indicators (holds) on their records. Service indicators on records may prevent disbursement of financial aid. All unpaid tuition/fees, housing charges, and other UF debts (such as, but not limited to, lab fees, infirmary charges, and library fines) are deducted from students' financial aid before disbursing the balance to the student. To decline automatic crediting of your university accounts receivable charges from your financial aid, contact UFS Disbursements at (352) 392-0737; please note—this MAY delay disbursement of your aid. **Financial aid cannot be used to pay prior-term tuition fees.**

Requirements To Receive Loans.

Students who are awarded a Federal Direct Stafford Loan, Federal Perkins Loan, or UF Long-Term Loan should see the Loans section of Chapter 3 for important information on requirements



WANT YOUR MAIL?

Keep Your Address Up to Date in the UF Directory through my.UFL

UF uses information in the UF Directory as the official address source for all UF business, including financial aid checks and correspondence.

You are responsible for keeping your

- (1) current e-mail address
- (2) your local home mailing address
- (3) your permanent home address
- (4) all phone numbers

up to date in the UF Directory. Update these addresses on ISIS or my.UFL. Be sure to read "SFA E-mail Correspondence" in Chapter 1.

to receive these loans. In all cases, the requirements must be fulfilled before any loan may be disbursed.

Short-Term Loans (STL) Disbursement

If you apply for an STL at Student Financial Affairs in S-107 Criser Hall and your application is approved, you will receive the loan check and a copy of the promissory note at your local address within 48 hours of the approval date; or by direct deposit into your checking account; or you will be given an appointment to pick up your check at University Financial Services in S-113 Criser Hall.

STUDENT LOANS & DEBT MANAGEMENT

In recent years, more students have begun to rely on educational loans to help pay for college. Educational loans can be an excellent resource for students trying to pay educational costs, but the amount of debt incurred should be considered carefully.

Borrowing money to pay for college has long-term financial implications. Like any other debt, a student loan is a serious financial obligation that must be repaid. In addition to the principal amount you borrow, you will be charged interest for use of the funds. The principal plus interest charged, divided by your repayment period in months, determines the amount of the monthly payments you will be required to make when you leave school. Failure to make on-time monthly payments may affect your credit rating and your ability to borrow for other purposes.

How Much Will You Be Able To Pay?

To determine how much indebtedness you will be able to manage when you graduate, consider your expected starting salary, earnings prospects, and lifestyle. Then estimate your level of debt and monthly payments and see if the two are in line. If you can't afford your projected payments, try to borrow less.

On the next pages are (1) a table of Entry Level Salaries, (2) a Loan Amounts Per Academic Year worksheet, (3) a Monthly Repayment Worksheet, and (4) a Budget Worksheet. Try to be realistic when projecting future earnings and how much you will need to live when you graduate. Remember that starting a new job and setting up living arrangements will require extra resources and create a heavy initial demand on your new income.

Key Points to Remember

- ✓ Develop a financial plan for the complete cost of your education.
- ✓ Consider your chosen field of employment and its expected annual income before you accept a student loan.
- ✓ Re-evaluate your future expenses each time you borrow.

Factors to Consider When Borrowing

Consider the following when planning how much to borrow:

Amount Think about how much you need to borrow. You may not want to borrow the full amount for which you are eligible.

Number of Loans Your total indebtedness will be affected by your plans for further study. For example, are you going to graduate school?

Loan Limits Most loan programs specify minimum and maximum amounts you can borrow.

Length of Repayment Period You will save interest costs if you choose a shorter repayment period. The Federal Direct Loan Program offers a variety of repayment options.

Minimum Monthly Payments Monthly payments will depend on the

amount you borrow and the repayment plan you select. Perkins Loans require a minimum payment of \$40 per month.

Borrowers Rights and Responsibilities

Be sure you understand your rights and responsibilities under each loan program. Keep all paperwork for future reference.

Good Credit Records

For most students, a student loan is their first experience with a credit program. Student loans can be an excellent way to finance an education and establish a good credit rating at the same time. Pay your student loan promptly each month. Frequent late payments constitute delinquency and may harm your credit history. Here are some tips on establishing good credit:

- ✓ Stay in contact with your lender/the federal loan servicer at all times. Notify them before you fall behind on payments.
- ✓ Notify your lender of any address or name change.
- ✓ Send your payment each month, even if not billed.
- ✓ Never ignore correspondence or a payment request.

Your Student Loan Exit Counseling Session

Any student who receives a student loan while attending UF **must** complete an online Student Loan Exit Counseling session when they graduate, drop below half-time enrollment, or withdraw from UF. Student Loan Exit Counseling is available at my.UFL. Under "My Campus Finances," select "Exit Loan Counseling, Student Loan." Failure to complete Exit Counseling may result in a hold (service indicator) being placed on your records, including your diploma, transcripts, and registration. Contact UFS at (352) 392-0737 if you have questions about exit counseling.

Office for Student Financial Affairs & University Financial Services

• **Student Financial Affairs** (that's us—the financial aid office) is located in S-107 Criser Hall. SFA administers financial aid. At SFA, you can talk to a financial aid adviser to resolve financial aid situations, find out about student jobs or scholarships, or apply for a short-term loan.

• **University Financial Services** (that's Student Accounts) in S-113, next door to SFA in Criser Hall, to pay tuition, fees, and all other university bills.

Direct Loan Borrower Services

When your loan is due, the federal loan servicer will mail you a payment schedule listing your monthly payment on principal and interest and the unpaid balance for each month of the period it takes to repay your total debt. If they do not contact you, you are responsible for contacting them at: U.S. Department of Education, Borrower Services, Direct Loan Payment Center, P. O. Box 530260, Atlanta, GA 30353-0260, 1-800-848-0979; 1-800-848-0983 (TDD). You can also contact Borrower Services on the Web, at <http://www.dlsonline.com>.

What If You Have Trouble

Repaying Your Loan?

Communicating with your lender/the federal loan servicer is the best policy. When it is time for repayment to begin, if you have extenuating circumstances or know you will not be able to meet your payment schedule or amount, contact the lender/federal loan servicer at once. Under certain conditions you may be eligible for a "forbearance" period; or, if you meet certain conditions, deferment may be possible. See the loan deferment, cancellation, and forbearance charts on the following pages. Conditions listed are subject to change; check with the federal loan servicer about eligibility conditions at the time you need the deferment.

Loan Consolidation

To qualify for *Federal Direct Consolidation Loans*, borrowers must have at least one Direct or Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL) Program loan that is in grace, repayment, deferment, or default status. Direct Consolidation Loans allow borrowers to combine one or more of their Federal education loans into a new loan that offers several advantages. There is no charge for consolidation, and consolidation loan rates cannot exceed 8.25 percent. Borrowers can choose from four plans that are designed to be flexible to meet the different and changing needs of borrowers, who can now switch repayment plans at any time. Following are just a few of the loans that may be consolidated: Federal Direct Stafford Loans, Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans, Federal Family Education Loans, Federal Perkins Loans, and Public Health Service Loans. Capitalization of Interest

If you request, and the federal government grants you, deferment of interest payments on a federal direct loan, be aware that the interest on your loan will continue to accumulate during deferment. Periodically, the accrued interest will be capitalized—added to the principal, so you will also pay interest on the accrued interest. The disadvantage to capitalizing interest is that you pay more interest over the life of the loan.

Example: If you owe \$5,000 in principal at 8% interest, approximately \$33.33 in interest will accrue on your loan each month. If the interest is capitalized quarterly (every three months), approximately \$99.99 will be added to your principal. At the end of one quarter the principal will increase to \$5,099.00, and interest will accrue on that amount for the next quarter. Depending upon how much you borrow, this could cost you a substantial amount.

Forbearance

Forbearance is a temporary postponement or reduction of payments for a period of time because of temporary financial difficulty. You can receive forbearance if you're not eligible for a deferment. Unlike deferment, whether your loans are subsidized or unsubsidized, interest accrues and you're responsible for repaying it. Your loan holder can grant forbearance, but you *must* continue to make payments until you've been notified your forbearance has been granted.

3. SFA Administered Aid

The Office for Student Financial Affairs administers federal, state, and university aid programs and a limited number of privately funded scholarships. SFA draws on these programs when making up students' financial aid packages.



The Office for Student Financial Affairs (SFA) is the financial aid office at UF. This chapter describes scholarship, grant, student loan, and student employment programs available through SFA.

The Federal Pell Grant program is the core federal student aid program. The financial aid office is the on-campus coordinator for this program, but students apply through the federal need analysis processor. The federal processor decides who receives this grant and determines the amounts of the awards. Other programs such as Federal Perkins Loans, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, and Federal WorkStudy are called *campus-based programs*, because they are entirely administered by the school. Each year, the government supplies the university with a specified amount of money for these programs. When this money is gone, no further funds are available for the year.

SFA also coordinates the Federal Direct Loan Program, which includes the Federal Direct Stafford Loans, Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans, and Federal Direct PLUS and Graduate PLUS Loans. In addition, SFA administers the Federal Academic Competitiveness Grant, Federal SMART and TEACH grant programs. SFA awards institutional funds in the form of Turner Grants, Graduate Grants, and UF loan programs and acts as the on-campus coordinator for State of Florida programs, such as Florida Student Assistance Grants and the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Programs.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships do not have to be repaid and do not require recipients to perform services to receive them. Several UF offices administer scholarships. For additional information on academic scholarships administered by other UF offices, see Chapter 4. For information on scholarships available through individual university departments and colleges, see Chapters 7 and 8, and/or check with your department or college. Information on State of Florida scholarships is provided in Chapter 5, and on private outside scholarships in Chapter 9.

SFA's Web site, <http://www.sfa.ufl.edu>, has a "Scholarship Finder" feature and provides access to several free scholarship services, as well as downloadable applications for some scholarships. Please take advantage of these resources which provide information on many private sector scholarships, fellowships, and loans.

SFA Awarded Scholarships

SFA awards and/or administers the following scholarships, non-endowed and endowed. Students are automatically considered if they:

1. apply for financial aid by the "on-time" deadline
2. have financial need as indicated by the FAFSA
3. enroll as a full-time student
4. have a 3.0 GPA
5. meet the donor-specified criteria.

Non-Endowed Scholarships

Jessie Ball duPont/Alfred I. duPont Scholarship

Established by Mrs. Jessie Ball duPont in memory of her husband. A guideline excerpt states: "These scholarships are to be given, not loaned, but the recipients are requested, after their graduation, when they have earning capacity, to pass a like amount, as they have received, on to some deserving boy or girl who needs assistance in acquiring an education. In this way, it will be a permanent chain for the benefit of our youth."

Eccleston-Callahan Memorial Trust Scholarship

This trust fund was established to provide scholarships for needy students with disabilities to help meet their costs of education. Selection is made in conjunction with Disability Resources in the Dean of Students Office.

Follett Bookstore Scholarship

The Follett Bookstore provides scholarships in the form of credit at their main campus bookstores. The credit equals the standard cost for undergraduate books and supplies excluding computer hardware.

Robert D. and Flora E. Fuhrman Scholarship

This memorial scholarship was established in 1982 from the estate of Robert D. and Flora E. Fuhrman to help needy students.

Metta Heathcote Scholarship

Established by a trust fund created by Mrs. Metta Heathcote, long-time resident of St. Petersburg, this scholarship is available to Pinellas County residents who have graduated from a Pinellas County high school. Awards are based on financial need with preference given to St. Petersburg residents.

UF General Scholarship**UF Southern Scholarship Foundation Scholarship Fund**

GRANTS

Grants are gift aid (no repayment required) awarded to students who show the greatest financial need. Students apply for the Federal Pell Grant, the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, the Florida Student Assistance Grant, Federal Academic Competitiveness Grant, SMART Grant, and the I. Douglas Turner Grant by completing a *FAFSA*.

Federal Pell Grant

The Federal Pell Grant program provides financial assistance to students who could not otherwise afford to pay for college as an undergraduate. The government awards grants according to each student's financial need as

determined by federal methodology, a congressionally established need analysis formula. Need for other aid is based upon and determined around the student's eligibility for Federal Pell Grant. Awards are prorated according to enrollment status and can be received at less than half time status if eligible. Awards range from \$976 to \$5,330 per academic year.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident
2. show financial need according to the *Federal Student Aid Report (SAR)*
3. be an undergraduate enrolled in a degree-seeking program
4. maintain satisfactory academic progress
5. not have defaulted on or owe a refund to any previous aid program.

To apply:

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)

This federally funded aid program is available to undergraduates who show exceptional financial need. UF selects recipients and determines award amounts based on greatest financial need. Awards at UF range from \$100 to \$2,000 a year.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident
2. have financial need as determined from aid application
3. be an undergraduate enrolled for at least six credit hours
4. maintain satisfactory academic progress
5. not have defaulted on or owe a refund to any previous aid program
6. be receiving a Federal Pell Grant.

To apply:

2005, is a federally funded undergraduate program. Awards range from \$1 to \$1,350.

To be eligible, you must

1. be a U.S. citizen;
2. be a Federal PELL Grant recipient;
3. have completed a rigorous high school program;
4. have graduated from high school after January 1, 2005;
5. be a first- or second-year student enrolled full-time in a degree program.

Students in their second academic year must have a cumulative college GPA of at least 3.0.

National Science and Mathematical Access to Retain Talent (SMART) Grant

The SMART Grant, also created by the HERA, is a federally funded undergraduate program. The maximum award per academic year is \$4,000.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen
2. be a Federal PELL Grant recipient;
3. be a third- or fourth-year student in federally specified degree-seeking program and enrolled in at least one course specific to the qualifying major each term;
4. be enrolled full-time in an eligible major; and
5. have a college cumulative GPA of at least 3.0.

Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grant

The TEACH Grant was created by the College Cost Reduction and Access Act for students who plan careers as full-time teachers in high-need subject areas. The grant provides up to \$4,000 per year in grants for graduate and undergraduate studies; part-time students are eligible, but the maximum grant will be reduced. The grant is also available for post-baccalaureate teacher certification coursework. If students do not fulfill **all** program requirements, TEACH grants must be repaid as Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans. Interest will accrue from the date of the original disbursement.

To be eligible, you must:

1. complete a FAFSA
2. be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen
3. be enrolled in one of UF's TEACH Grant Eligible programs
4. meet specific academic achievement requirements
5. complete TEACH Grant loan entrance and subsequent loan counseling

6. sign a TEACH Grant Agreement to Serve each year, available electronically at <http://www.teach-ats.ed.gov>.

To apply:

Florida Student Assistance Grant (FSAG)

The Florida Student Assistance Grant is a state-funded program awarded to qualified undergraduates who show financial need and academic promise and who have maintained Florida residency at least 12 months before the beginning of the term for which they are applying. Awards range from \$200 to \$1,916 per academic year.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident;
2. be an undergraduate enrolled at least six credit hours in a degree-seeking program—students unable to enroll 12 hours due to their disabilities may qualify for financial assistance with part-time enrollment at a prorated award amount;
3. be a Florida resident for 12 consecutive months before the beginning of the academic year;
4. meet state academic progress standards for renewal of FSAG;
5. have a minimum 2.0 GPA;
6. meet Selective Service registration requirements;
7. not have defaulted on or owe a refund to a state or federal aid program;
8. to renew—have earned 12 credit hours each semester FSAG was received the previous academic year;
9. have a family contribution less than or equal to the amount required by the Florida Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA);
10. meet College-Level Academic Skills Test (CLAST) requirements.

To apply:

2. If you are eligible, OSFA will notify you directly.

I. Douglas Turner Grant

These grants are awarded to students who show extreme financial need. UF selects the recipients of this award. Turner Grants are funded by UF. This grant ranges in value from \$100 to \$5,000. Eligibility requirements are the same as for FSEOG, with the exception that the student does not need to receive a Federal Pell Grant to receive these grants.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident;
2. have financial need as determined from aid application;
3. be an undergraduate enrolled for at least six credit hours;
4. maintain satisfactory academic progress; and
5. not have defaulted on or owe a refund to any previous aid program.

To apply:

See "How to Apply" in Chapter 1.

UF Graduate and Professional Grants

This UF-funded grant program is awarded by SFA to graduate and professional students who demonstrate exceptional financial need. This grant ranges in value from \$100 to \$2,000.

To be eligible, you must:

STUDENT LOANS

Educational loans are the largest financial resource available to students pursuing postsecondary education. Student loan programs, which allow students to borrow low interest money with no collateral and generally no co-signer, are considered financial aid. Most do not need to be repaid until the student graduates or drops to less than half-time status.

Borrowing money for college is a serious financial obligation. In addition to principal borrowed, interest is generally charged for use of funds. It's important to remember when you borrow money that it must eventually be repaid. When signing a loan promissory note, you make a legal and ethical agreement. Legally, you will be required to sign the note promising to repay the loan. Ethically, you are responsible to future borrowers, since collections from old loans are a major funding source for new loans. Consider this commitment carefully when taking out a loan, and consider how much you reasonably can repay. Read more about loans and debt management in Chapter 2, Money Matters.

Federal Direct Loan Program

The Federal Direct Loan Program consists of the Federal Direct Subsidized Stafford Loan, the Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loan, the Federal Direct PLUS Loan, the Federal Direct Graduate PLUS Loan, and the Federal Direct Consolidation Loan. The U.S.

Department of Education is the lender and, except for consolidation loans, delivers loan proceeds through the school. Loans are disbursed after classes have begun. When it is time for repayment, you (or your parents) will send all loan payments to the federal loan servicer.

★ Federal Direct Subsidized Stafford Loans

Subsidized Stafford Loans are need-based, federally subsidized loans that have repayment deferred until after you graduate, withdraw, or enroll less than half time. Interest is paid by the federal government until the end of the six months grace period after you drop to less than half-time enrollment. For information on deferment and repayment, see "Loan Repayment, Deferment, Cancellation, and Forbearance Info" in Chapter 2.

Students may borrow the following amounts through the subsidized Stafford Program: first-year students may borrow up to \$3,500 per year, second-year students up to \$4,500, and third- to fifth-year students up to \$5,500. The cumulative total undergraduate students may borrow is \$23,000. Graduate students may borrow \$8,500 a year up to a \$65,500 cumulative total, minus what they borrowed as undergraduates.

For new loans made to undergraduate borrowers, this program has a fixed interest rate of 5.6%. For graduate borrowers, this program has a fixed interest rate of 6.8%. All borrowers are charged a 1.5% origination fee at disbursement. For more information, go to <http://www.dlssonline.com>.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident
2. be enrolled at least half-time
3. show financial need on your FAFSA need analysis report
4. not have defaulted on or owe a refund to any previous aid program
5. maintain satisfactory academic progress
6. petition for eligibility, if a post-baccalaureate student.

To apply:

Requirements for Disbursement:

1. *First-Time Borrower Entrance Counseling*: First-time Federal Direct Stafford Loan borrowers must complete Entrance Counseling before their loan funds can be disbursed to them. Complete entrance counseling by going to <http://www.dl.ed.gov>.

2. *Federal Direct Stafford Loan Acceptance*: Stafford borrowers must accept each loan award before their funds can be released. Complete this requirement on ISIS. Under "Financial Aid," choose "Awards and Disbursements" for 2009-10. Students can also reduce or cancel their Stafford Loan here.
3. *Master Promissory Notes (MPN)*: Previous Federal Direct Stafford Loan borrowers should already have an MPN on file. New borrowers who do not have an MPN on file must go to the Federal Direct Loan MPN Web site, <http://dlenote.ed.gov> to complete one.

★ Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans

Unsubsidized Stafford Loans are non-need-based loans for students who do not qualify, in whole or in part, for subsidized Stafford Loans. "Unsubsidized" means that the interest is not deferred while you are in school. The interest rate is fixed at 6.8% with a 1.5% origination fee. Because unsubsidized loans are not need-based, you may be able to borrow funds over and above your eligibility for subsidized Stafford Loans, either up to your cost of education minus other aid, or up to Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loan limits, whichever is less. **Note:** To be eligible for an unsubsidized loan, you must have first applied for a Federal Pell Grant and a subsidized Stafford Loan.

For unsubsidized Staffords, because the federal government does not pay the interest while you are in school, you must pay all interest that accrues while you are in school, both during the grace period and during any periods of authorized deferment. You will have the following options: (1) making monthly or quarterly payments to the federal loan servicer, or (2) you and the federal loan servicer may agree to add the interest to the principal of your loan—*capitalization*. The disadvantage of capitalizing interest is that you pay more interest over the life of the loan because you are also paying interest on the accrued interest. See Chapter 2 for information on capitalization of interest.

Application and disbursement information are the same as for subsidized Stafford Loans.

★ Federal Direct PLUS

Through the Federal Direct PLUS Loan and Federal Direct Graduate PLUS Loan programs, parents of dependent undergraduate students, as well as graduate and professional students, may

borrow up to the cost of education minus other financial aid.

These loans become payable at the date of disbursement, unless deferred (see "Loan Deferment," Chapter 2). For new borrowers, the program has a fixed interest rate of 7.9%. A 4% origination fee is charged at disbursement.

To be eligible:

1. the borrower must be a parent or eligible step-parent of a dependent undergraduate student; a graduate student; or a professional student;
2. the student must be enrolled at least half-time;
3. the student must maintain satisfactory academic progress;
4. the borrower and the student must not have defaulted on or owe a refund to any previous aid program;
5. parent borrowers and students must be U.S. citizens, nationals or permanent residents; and
6. borrowers must have no adverse credit history.

To apply:

1. Parent borrowers must complete a *Federal Direct PLUS Loan Application* at <http://www.sfa.ufl.edu/pub/forms.html>.
2. First time graduate borrowers must complete a *Federal Direct Graduate PLUS Loan Application* at <http://www.my.ufl.edu>. Under "My Campus Finances," select "Entrance Counseling."
3. When the loan is processed, go to <http://dlenote.ed.gov> to either complete a *Master Promissory Note* or verify that one is already on file.

To receive funds:

1. See "Receiving Your Financial Aid" in Chapter 2.
2. Once classes have begun, Federal requirements have been completed, and UF has verified that the student is enrolled at least half-time, UF issues these checks to the borrower.

★ Federal Direct Consolidation Loan Program

Students who borrow from more than one loan program may want to consider consolidation of their loans when it comes time for repayment. See Chapter 2 for more information.

★ Federal Perkins Loan

The Federal Perkins Loan is a federally funded, long-term, low-interest loan with repayment deferred until after you graduate, withdraw, or drop to less than half-time enrollment. Student

Financial Affairs selects recipients and determines loan amounts based on greatest financial need as determined from students' FAFSA. To be considered for this program, apply as soon as possible after January 1.

Undergraduate students may borrow up to \$4,000 an academic year, up to a total of \$27,500 toward an undergraduate degree through the Federal Perkins Loan program. Graduate students may borrow up to \$6,000 a year up to a total of \$40,000, including both undergraduate and graduate loans. Repayment is made in equal installments, beginning nine months after you withdraw, graduate, or drop to below half-time status. The minimum repayment amount is \$40 a month, and 5% interest is charged on the unpaid balance. See "Loan Repayment, Deferment, Cancellation, and Forbearance Info" in Chapter 2.

The maximum time for repayment is ten years, not including deferred payment time. Provisions are made for deferment or cancellation of loan repayment under specific circumstances. See "Loan Repayment, Deferment, Cancellation, and Forbearance Info" in Chapter 2.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident;
2. show need on your FAFSA need analysis report;
3. maintain satisfactory academic progress;
4. not be in default on or owe a refund to any previous aid program; and
5. be enrolled at least half-time.

To apply:

See "How to Apply" in Chapter 1.

To receive funds:

1. See "Receiving Your Financial Aid" in Chapter 2.
2. First-time Federal Perkins Loan borrowers must complete Entrance Counseling before their loans can be disbursed. Before the start of classes, University Financial Services (UFS) will mail instructions on how to complete online Entrance Counseling. For more information, call UFS at (352) 392-0737. See "Disbursement" in Chapter 2, or go to <http://fa.ufl.edu/ufs/disbursements/loan-counseling.asp>.
3. First-time Federal Perkins Loan borrowers must complete an online *Federal Perkins Master Promissory Note* (MPN) to receive their loans. UFS mails borrowers instructions on how to sign the online MPN.

4. Complete the federal Perkins Loan Disclosure/Acceptance process. Perkins Loan "disclosures" are completed on ISIS under "Financial Aid" under "Aid Status." Federal Perkins Loan Acceptance is done on ISIS under "Financial Aid" under "Awards and Disbursements." For more information, contact University Financial Services in S-113 Criser Hall.

★ **UF Long-Term Loans**

UF long-term loans are available to full-time students. Funds are donated by many private donors and administered by UF. The amount and type of loans a student receives will vary according to their financial need as determined from their FAFSA or *Renewal FAFSA*.

Interest on UF loans ranges from 4 to 9% a year, depending on the loan fund, and begins accruing upon repayment. Repayment begins six months after graduation or dropping to less than half-time enrollment. Repayment schedules are handled individually with a recommended minimum of \$20 a month. These loans require an endorser over 18 years old who is not a student or student spouse. Parents are preferred. You have ten years for repayment. If you enter active military service, you may defer repayment for the period of your original enlistment or compulsory service in the armed forces.

Major UF Long-Term Loan funds include: Student Aid for Education (SAFE); Meril S. Beers; Hart R. Stringfellow; Cora B. Pilling; Arthur L. Wallace; John G. and Fannie F. Ruge Memorial funds.

To be eligible for UF Long-Term Loans, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident;
2. show need on your FAFSA need analysis report;
3. maintain satisfactory academic progress
4. not have defaulted on, or owe a refund to, any previous aid program;
5. be enrolled half-time.

To apply:

See "How to Apply" in Chapter 1.

To receive funds:

1. See "Receiving Your Financial Aid" in Chapter 2.
2. Borrowers with UF long-term loans will receive a promissory note by mail from University Financial Services in S-108 Criser Hall. These promissory notes must be signed and returned to S-108 Criser before the loans can be disbursed.

★ **UF Emergency Short-Term Loans**

Short-Term Loans (STL) are available to students enrolled at least half-time to help meet temporary, **emergency** financial needs related to educational expenses. Registered students with valid repayment sources may borrow up to \$1,000, if tuition is paid or deferred, or the amount of their in-state tuition.

Major Short-Term Loan funds include: Claude S. Ginn Memorial Educational; Edward J. Triay Jr. Memorial; B. A. Tolbert Memorial; Exxon Loans; Sarafem Dervech Loans; and Dean R.C. Beaty Memorial funds.

Interest is computed monthly at the rate of 1% on the unpaid balance from the date the loan is disbursed. A minimum of one month's interest will be charged if the loan is paid in full within 30 days. Short-Term Loans must be repaid, either when the repayment source is received or by the first day of the last month in the semester in which the loan is taken out, whichever comes first. Payment may be made at University Financial Services in S-108 Criser Hall at any time before the due date.

See Chapter 2 for disbursement information.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be enrolled at least half-time as an undergraduate or graduate student;
2. have a valid repayment source; and
3. have no "flags" or credit holds.

To apply:

1. See an adviser at Student Financial Affairs in S-107 Criser Hall to complete an application.
2. Approved STL awards are normally disbursed within 48 hours after submitting the application.

REPAYMENT OF LOANS

When you graduate or leave school, if you have taken out any student loans, you are required to have an Exit Counseling session with University Financial Services (UFS) at S-108 Criser. Exit Counseling is conducted through my.UFL under "My Campus Finances," select "Loan Exit Counseling."

Educational loans awarded by UF (Federal Perkins Loans and UF Institutional Loans, such as SAFE Loans) may be repaid in equal or graduated installments. The minimum monthly repayment for Federal Perkins Loans is \$40. The university may require a minimum repayment for institutional loans of \$30 a month.

Federal Direct Loan Repayment

Four repayment plans are available under the Direct Consolidation Loan Program. Direct PLUS borrowers are eligible for all except the Income Contingent Repayment Plan. In addition to an income contingent repayment plan, the following repayment plans will be available to Direct Loan borrowers who enter repayment on their loans on or after July 1, 2006:

- A *standard repayment plan* has fixed monthly payments for a maximum of ten years.
- A *graduated repayment plan* has monthly payments that begin lower and increase every two years; the loan must be repaid in ten years.
- The *extended repayment plan* sets fixed or graduated monthly payments over a period of time not more than 25 years. Extended repayment plans are available only to borrowers on or after October 7, 1998, who have an outstanding Direct Loan balance of more than \$30,000.
- In the *Income Contingent Repayment (ICR) Plan*, your monthly payment is adjusted each year based on your annual income (and spouse's if married), family size, and total amount for your Direct Loans. After 25 years, any unpaid amount is forgiven (not available to Direct PLUS borrowers).

For more on repayment, see "Loan Consolidation," "Capitalization of Interest," and "Loan Repayment, Deferment, Cancellation, and Forbearance Info" in Chapter 2.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The Student Employment Office in S-107 Criser Hall helps enrolled students find part-time employment through various job programs. Employment enables students to cover part of their expenses while attending school. Studies show that work has positive effects on students' overall academic achievements. Job opportunities exist for all students whether or not they are eligible for financial aid.

Employment should not interfere with students' educational goals. A normal workweek is 10 to 20 hours, and 20 hours per week is the maximum students may work on campus. Students and employers generally cooperate on the hours to be worked, and most jobs allow students to arrange their schedules around their classes. Students are not permitted to work during scheduled classes or exams.

employs students part-time. These jobs offer students work related to their skills, academic or career fields, and experiences or interests. Job duties range from those demanding special research skills to those demanding only the willingness to work.

Jobs are available through two programs: Federal Work-Study (FWS) and Other Personnel Services (OPS). Students can access available jobs by going to <http://jobs.ufl.edu>.

Federal Work-Study (FWS) Program/Federal Community Service

The purpose of FWS is to provide students with part-time employment to help meet college costs and, if possible, provide work experience in a related field. FWS is federally funded and need-based. Your eligibility is determined from information you provide on your FAFSA. To be eligible, you must show need on your federal need analysis report. The number of hours you may work will depend upon your financial need. If FWS is part of your financial aid, you must print a UF Work Permit from ISIS. Under "Awards & Disbursements," choose "Print Work Permit."

Federal Community Service

The FWS program includes Federal Community Service (FCS) and also the "America Reads" program. FCS allows students to work off-campus with various community agencies dedicated to improving community living, especially for low-income individuals. All requirements for FWS apply to FCS. "America Reads" is a tutoring program promoted by the federal government to help elementary school students improve their reading skills. In addition to applying for financial aid through SFA (see "How to Apply" in Chapter I), students interested in "America Reads" should contact the College of Education Program Coordinator, (352) 392-9191 ext. 253.

Earnings through FWS vary with the nature of the job, your skills, and the hours you can work. Salaries start at minimum wage and range upward according to skills and experience. Most students work 10 to 20 hours a week. Employers usually prefer students to work three or more consecutive hours depending on their class schedules. To retain FICA exempt status, students must enroll for six credit hours and work no more than 20 hours a week.

To be eligible, you must:

1. be a U.S. citizen, national, or permanent resident;
2. show need on your FAFSA need analysis report;
3. maintain satisfactory academic progress (2.0 GPA);
4. be enrolled at least half-time as an undergraduate or graduate student;
5. not have defaulted on or owe a refund to any aid program; and
6. postbaccalaureate students must petition for eligibility.

To apply:

1. See "How to Apply" in Chapter 1.
2. If FWS is part of your financial aid, you must print a UF Work Permit from ISIS. Under "Awards & Disbursements," choose "Print Work Permit." A UF Work Permit is not required for OPS jobs.
3. Student Employment job lists are available online. For information on jobs and how to apply, go to <http://jobs.ufl.edu>.

Other Personnel Services (OPS)

OPS is state-funded and is not based on need. To be eligible, students employed by UF must have at least a 2.0 GPA and be enrolled for at least six credit hours per semester. Average earnings are generally the same as for work-study jobs. The total hours students can work and the amount earned will depend upon the hiring department's budget and need. Students must report OPS income on their aid applications the following year. A UF work permit is not required for OPS jobs. To apply, see "How to Find a Job," above.

Off-Campus Employment

Off-campus jobs do not require students to demonstrate financial need. Check the Career Resource Center job postings at <http://www.crc.ufl.edu/Employer/jobposting.php>. Wages will vary depending upon the job and the employer.

Cooperative Education

The Cooperative (Co-op) Education Program combines actual paid work experience with students' academic curriculums. This program is career oriented—its primary purpose is professional training rather than financial assistance. Co-op experience is available in areas such as business, industry, and government.

To qualify for Co-op, you must have completed your freshman year with at least a 2.0 average. Co-op salaries vary, but students earn enough to allow them to pay immediate living expenses and often to supplement college expenses. Two work formats are available:

1. The alternating plan allows you to work full-time every other semester. For example, you may work fall semester, attend the university spring semester, and work summer session. Most UF Co-op students follow this plan.
2. Students work a minimum of 20 hours per week within commutable distance of the Gainesville area, while continuing to attend class. To complete the program, six semesters of parallel experience are required for undergraduate engineering students, and four are required for undergraduate students in non-engineering majors and graduate students. The parallel plan allows you to work and attend classes at the same time.

Internships

Internships are professional, off-campus work experiences that assist students in acquiring experience and skills that help make them competitive in today's job market.

Internships are usually for one semester, which makes them ideal for students unable to meet Co-op work-semester requirements. Part-time positions are available locally. Internship experience is available to most majors, can be paid or unpaid, and may be available for academic credit based on departmental approval.

Externships

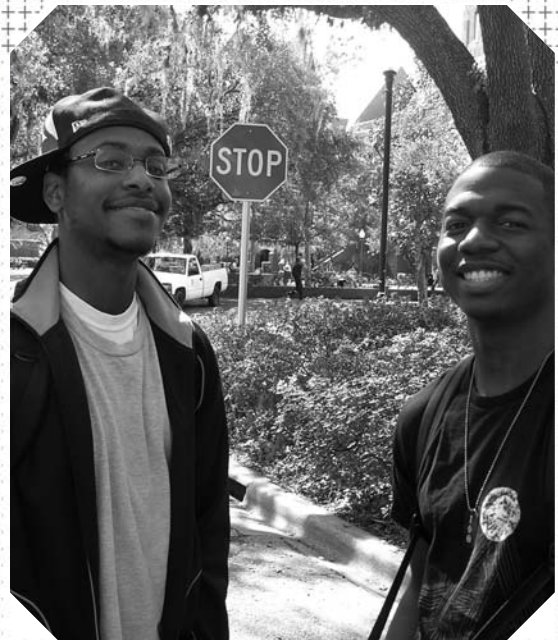
An externship is an employer shadowing experience that typically lasts from a few hours to one week. Externships provide students with the opportunity to observe professionals and learn about possible careers in that field. This is a great option for students of any academic year who are unsure of their major or career goals and want to "test" a career without a semester-long (or longer) commitment to a company, or who want to start networking with professionals in that industry.

General eligibility requirements for all programs are as follows:

1. Students must meet Florida residency requirements for receipt of state student financial aid by maintaining residency in Florida for purposes other than

education for a minimum of 12 consecutive months before the first day of class of the academic term for which funds are requested. Whether an individual meets residency requirements is determined by the postsecondary institution at which he or she enrolls. Applicants with questions about residency status should contact the University of Florida Admissions Office.

2. Students may not owe a repayment under any state or federal grant, loan, or scholarship programs, unless satisfactory arrangements to repay have been made.
3. Students may not be in default on any federal Title IV or state student loan program, unless satisfactory arrangements to repay have been made.

Some programs listed here also require completion of the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA). The FAFSA is available online at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>.

Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarships Program

The Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarship Program is administered by the Florida Department of Education and funded by the U.S. Department of Education (USDOE). It provides scholarships to outstanding high school seniors who show promise of continued academic achievement. Awards are distributed

equitably through all geographic regions in Florida.

Eligibility: To be considered, students must submit a completed, error free *Florida Financial Aid Application* by April 15th. High schools may nominate one student per high school by May 15. Nominated applicants are ranked and awarded by the FDOE according to available funding.

Value: Determined annually by USDOE

Scholarships for Children and Spouses of Deceased or Disabled Veterans and Service Members

The State of Florida provides scholarships for dependent children and unmarried spouses of Florida veterans or service members who died as a result of service-connected injuries, diseases, or disabilities sustained while on active duty or have been verified by the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs as having service-connected 100% total and permanent disabilities. The Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs will certify the official status of veterans or service members.

Application: Applicants must submit a completed *Florida Financial Aid Application* and ensure that the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs certifies the applicant's eligibility by April 1.

Value: Cost of tuition and fees for two semesters; up to 132 credit hours or completion of an undergraduate degree at an eligible public postsecondary institution.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

The Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program provides scholarships based on high school academic achievement. It has three award levels: the Florida Academic Scholars Award, Florida Medallion Scholars Award, and Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars Award. Each award has different academic criteria for eligibility, receives a different award amount, and is prorated by term and hours, excluding summer term. The Florida Academic Scholar with the highest academic ranking in each county will also receive the Florida Top Scholars Award, a \$750 award per semester.

Eligibility and Application:

Students must submit a completed *Florida Financial Aid Application* during their last year in high school (after December 1st and prior to graduation).

Value: Varies

Florida Student Assistance Grants

José Martí Scholarship

The José Martí Scholarship Challenge Grant Fund provides scholarship assistance to Hispanic-American students who meet scholastic requirements and demonstrate financial need. Applicants for undergraduate study must apply during their senior year of high school. Graduate students may apply; however, priority for the scholarship is given to graduating high school seniors.

Application: To be considered, students must submit a completed, error free *Florida Financial Aid Application* and provide supporting documentation by April 1. Students must also submit a completed error free FAFSA in time to be processed by the U.S. Department of Education by May 15.

Value: \$2,000 per academic year

Rosewood Family Scholarship

The Rosewood Scholarship is a need-based scholarship that provides assistance for up to 25 eligible minority students to attend a state university. Direct descendants of African-American Rosewood families affected by the incidents of January 1923 receive priority for awards.

Application: Applicants must complete and submit the *Florida Financial Aid Application* by April 1 and submit a FAFSA to the U.S. Department of

Education in time to be processed by May 15. Students must also provide documentation of ancestry to OSFA by April 1.

Value: Tuition and fees for 15 semester hours of undergraduate study, not to exceed \$4,000, or the amount established in the General Appropriations Act, whichever is less. Awards will be prorated if funds are insufficient to provide the maximum award to each of the 25 recipients.

Ethics in Business Scholarship

In 1997, the Florida Legislature established an ethics scholarship challenge grant as part of the State of Florida's settlement with the Prudential Insurance Corporation. This grant allows private endowment gifts to be matched 100%. In addition to criteria established by individual donors, the Legislature has added the requirements of need, an ethics course, and community service.

Application: Applicant must provide a completed 2009-10 application form; a current official (not a photocopy) transcript from the community college; a statement of your career goals, achievements, and activities; three letters of reference addressing your academic success and potential; and a completed 2009-10 FAFSA. To receive full consideration, the FAFSA should be submitted no later than June 15, 2009. Need and need/merit applicants only.

6. Aid for Students with Disabilities

This chapter describes programs available specifically for students with disabilities who need financial assistance to help pay college expenses. In addition to resources in this chapter, students may apply for general aid programs open to the entire student body through the University of Florida (UF) Admissions Office, the federal government, the state of Florida, university colleges and departments, and private organizations.



SFA in S-107 Criser Hall offers eligible students financial aid packages that consist of scholarships, grants, loans and/or part-time employment. SFA coordinates or administers most major student aid programs and a number of privately funded scholarships and offers financial aid counseling to students. To apply for aid available through SFA, follow the instructions in "How To Apply," in Chapter 1.

Students who need special help applying for aid should contact SFA. SFA's telephone line for students with speech or hearing impairments is (352) 392-1272 (V/TDD). Students with speech or hearing impairments who need to contact an agency on campus that does not list a TDD number may use the free Florida Relay Service by dialing 711, or 1 (800) 955-8771 (TTY). Graduate Aid

Most graduate students, regardless of disability, pay for their education with scholarships, employment, loans, savings, assistantships, and family contributions. Graduate students should apply for assistance through their major department and through SFA. See "Chapter 8, Graduate Aid."

COORDINATION WITH THE DEAN OF STUDENTS OFFICE

The Disability Resource Center (DRC) is part of the Dean of Students Office and works together with SFA in Criser Hall to assist students with disabilities. Criser Hall, Peabody Hall, and Reid Hall (where the Disability Resource Center is located) are all accessible buildings. Students may contact DRC or SFA to discuss financial aid issues.

Disability-Related Expenses

Students with disabilities frequently have expenses not incurred by other students and, when applying for financial aid through SFA, may qualify for an increase in their educational budgets. Costs of special equipment, fees for special services such as readers, interpreters, note takers, or personal care attendants, and medical costs related to the disability are all considered disability-related expenses. Disability Resources will help determine disability-related expenses. When these expenses have been identified, students should submit a *Budget Revision Petition* form (<http://www.sfa.ufl.edu/pub/forms.html>) to SFA documenting any such expenses

not paid for or provided by another agency.

Although administered by the colleges, many of these scholarships are funded by private individuals and institutions. In most cases, these awards are given to juniors and seniors who have been accepted for admission into a particular program. Some, however, are designated for freshmen and/or sophomores.



Most scholarships and awards included here are based on academic performance, but some also depend upon financial need. For information and applications, check with the contact person listed for the college or department which administers the award.

Alumni Graduates represent the highest graduate student award available at UF. To ensure that Alumni Graduates receive every opportunity to succeed, the AGP provides four full years of support through a nationally competitive stipend and tuition waiver for qualifying students. Most Alumni Graduates will receive both research and teaching assignments. UF expects Alumni Graduates to demonstrate high standards of academic achievement and participation in university life. Applicants for the AGP apply through the departments or programs of their major field of study. Successful applicants will have outstanding undergraduate preparation, a strong commitment to their field of study, and demonstrated potential in research and creative activities. The Graduate School Fellowships

Graduate School fellowships are named in honor of Dr. Linton E. Grinter, who was Dean of the Graduate School, 1952-1969. The intent of the Grinter Fellowship is to facilitate the recruitment of truly exceptional graduate students to UF. Ordinarily, the Grinter is limited to PhD students. Exceptions are made for those areas in the University that have a terminal degree different from the PhD (e.g. Master of Fine Arts, Architecture, Building Construction, and Landscape Architecture). Grinter Fellowships are not assistantships. No duties may be required of the student (except those associated with an assistantship held concurrently). Grinter Fellowship stipends are normally in the \$2,000–\$4,000 range. Continuation of the Grinter beyond the first year (up to a total of three years) is contingent upon satisfactory student progress.
